

## FREE AND EASY IN WESTERN MASS

Free. It's a four-letter word. And didn't Mom always warn you not to use them? Well, when it comes to activities, (with or without young'uns in tow,) "free" is often a word we love to hear. Or even better, read on the sign out front.

So for this blog entry, we're going to point out a goodly handful of things to do in Western Mass that won't cost you a thin dime to enjoy. Some are more seasonal than others, so be sure to check ahead before visiting.

In no particular order of roaming round the Valley, <u>Yankee Candle Village</u> in Deerfield didn't become the second most-visited attraction in the state for nothing. Filled with fragrant candles and home décor items, (plus animatronic singing figures and a bunch more fun) it's worth a free shopping-optional look-see any time. Not far from Yankee, the <u>Northfield Mountain</u> <u>Recreation and Environmental Center</u> offers twenty-five miles of carriage-width trails; bubbling brooks, spring wildflowers and a mile-long nature trail.

Drop down to Hampshire County and discover the cool vibe of our two classic college towns, Northampton and Amherst. The former is home of Smith College, the latter includes UMass, Amherst College and Hampshire College. With abundant free art galleries on and off-campus, plus a distinctly bohemian scene in the many coffee shops and eateries, a no-cost walk down the street becomes an adventure in itself.

Greater Springfield is filled with freebies, too! The <u>Dr. Seuss National Memorial Sculpture</u>
<u>Garden</u> can be enjoyed free of charge during museum hours, and just blocks away, the
<u>Connecticut River Walk and Bikeway</u> invites pedestrians and pedalers alike. In nearby Holyoke, the <u>Dinosaur Tracks Park</u> offers a fascinating opportunity to see hundreds of fossil footprints frozen in stone.
